The abstract must be written in a single paragraph. It should summarise the essential aspects of the work: the context and motivation, the objective, the methodology or approach, the main results, and the eventual contributions. The abstract should be self-contained and understandable without reference to the main text.

## 1 Structure of the abstract

Each extended abstract, containing between 1 and 3 pages (including figures and tables, excluding references), will be published on the conference website. Submissions must respect the format of this template, including the page layout, the title, the list of authors with their affiliations, and underlining the presenting author. Submissions may be written in English or French.

The extended abstract should contain a short abstract (see above), a list of keywords, a main body structured into sections, and a bibliography.

Extended abstracts are not expected to be full papers, but the content should be clear and concise, motivate the topic, and present the main results and conclusions.

Extended abstracts should be submitted according to the procedure described on the conference website, before **November, 7 2025**.

Abstracts which are longer than 3 pages or submitted after the deadline will be **automatically rejected**.

### 1.1 Subsection title

Formulas and equations must be numbered, as in the following example of the Horvitz-Thompson (1952) estimator [2]:

$$\hat{t}_\pi = \sum_{k \in s} \frac{y_k}{\pi_k}. \quad (1)$$
